MEETING MINUTES

ADJOURNED SPECIAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS COUNTY OF PLUMAS, STATE OF CALIFORNIA HELD IN QUINCY ON AUGUST 24, 2021

STANDING ORDERS

Due to the Coronavirus disease (COVID-19) Public Health Emergency, dated March 16, 2020, the County of Plumas is making several changes related to Board of Supervisors meetings to protect the public's health and prevent the disease from spreading locally.

California Governor Gavin Newsom issued Executive Order N-29-20 on March 17, 2020, relating to the convening of public meetings in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Pursuant to the Executive Order, and the Governor's temporary partial exemptions to the Brown Act, and to maintain the orderly conduct of the meeting, the County of Plumas members of the Board of Supervisors may attend the meeting via teleconference or phone conference and participate in the meeting to the same extent as if they were physically present. Due to the Governor's temporary, partial exemption to the Brown Act, the Boardroom will be open to the public but subject to social distancing requirements, which limit the number of people that may enter to 25% of room capacity. Those that wish to attend the Board meeting, will be required to wear a face covering, as required by the local Public Health Officer order. The public may participate as follows:

Governor Newsom Requests Presidential Major Disaster Declaration to Aid Wildfire Response and Recovery Efforts

SACRAMENTO – Working to bolster California’s emergency response to multiple wildfires and support impacted communities, Governor Gavin Newsom today requested a Presidential Major Disaster Declaration to assist state and local wildfire response and recovery efforts in Lassen, Nevada, Placer, Plumas, Shasta, Siskiyou, Tehama and Trinity counties.

“We are deploying every available tool we have to keep communities safe as California battles these catastrophic wildfires driven by climate change impacts,” said Governor Newsom. “Even while the fires continue to burn, we are working to put assistance programs in place for impacted individuals to support their recovery from these devastating fires.”

This federal request is specific to the Dixie, Antelope, McFarland, Monument and River fires. A subsequent request may be made for the Caldor and other fires once fire conditions allow state, local and federal officials to safely assess the scope of damage.

If approved, a Presidential Major Disaster Declaration will help people in the impacted counties through eligibility for programs and support that can include housing assistance, food aid, counseling, medical services and legal services. The request includes public assistance to help state, tribal and local governments with ongoing emergency response and recovery costs. The request also includes hazard mitigation, which helps state and local governments reduce the risks and impacts of future disasters.

Currently there are 12 major fires burning across the state, causing extensive damage to residences and infrastructure. As of August 22, 13,712 personnel and 1,031 engines are at work on the front lines of wildfires statewide.

Although wildfires are actively burning, the state and its partners are working quickly to provide California communities the resources they need to get back home as soon as it is safe to do so. The state is already removing household hazardous waste due to fires in multiple counties, the first stage of returning damaged properties to their owners. There are also teams on the ground conducting damage assessments documenting the extent of the losses so that the state can maximize its requests for federal aid.

In addition, the state provided millions of dollars in California Disaster Assistance Act Public Assistance advance funding to Plumas and Alpine counties. This advance funding provides financial assistance from the state for costs incurred by local governments because of a disaster event – due to the magnitude of the damage sustained in Plumas County due to the Dixie Fire and in Alpine County from the Tamarack Fire.

California recently secured Fire Management Assistance Grants (FMAGs) from the Federal Emergency Management Agency to support the state’s response to the Dixie Fire in Lassen, Butte and Plumas counties and the response to the Caldor Fire, Monument Fire, River Fire and Lava Fire.

Governor Newsom has activated the State Operations Center to its highest level and proclaimed a state of emergency in counties impacted by the Caldor Fire, McFarland and Monument fires, Antelope and River fires, Dixie, Fly and Tamarack fires and the Lava Fire and Beckwourth Complex Fire. The Governor signed an executive order to support impacted communities and bolster wildfire response and recovery efforts.

As of this moment on 8/18/21 I have the following total amount of costs that I have receipts for or bills pending payment \$45,420.05

In addition to that, I am waiting on a billing from River Pines for LEMA lodging that has not been billed yet. I am trying to get a W9 from MiCasita in Chester for LEMA meals in the amount of \$391.80. I am waiting on a W9 from Sierra Sky Lodge for LEMA to pay an invoice in the amount of \$1,220.80

I have a resource order for Sonoma County Animal Services for two units at Graeagle Properties with the amounts listed as \$2,127.50 & \$2,519.00 for 8/11-8/20

I have a resource order for lodging for a Logistics Chief at the Feather Bed 8/11-8/20 and there is no cost noted

I have a resource order for Sonoma County animal Services at Camp Layman for 8/10-8/11 in the amount of \$305.00 and I was advised it was charged to Gabriel's card.

I have an invoice for Ada's Place for 8/11-8/18 in the amount of \$1,087.80 for an EOC Operations Section Chief (I do not know who is paying this or if I should – PLEASE ADVISE)

I know that we will be receiving additional billings for lodging for LEMA officers.

I know there is a cost for Tennille's first stay here from Ada's Place but I have not been provided a receipt for the cost.

There are additional costs from the EOC for meals that did not have the sign in sheets (which are required to obtain reimbursement) and another EOC receipt that needed a sign in sheet & justification for the expense. I do not have those expenses included because I am waiting for the documents to be returned to me with all of the back up that is required. Those charges are on Carson's Cal card.

I will continue to track what costs are provided to me and input them for potential future reimbursement. I am also working closely with CalOES recovery and have had several conversations providing information for the advance funding request.

I hope to have the Sheriff & Animal Control time added to the workbook tomorrow and I will have a more accurate cost for the overtime, etc. The ballpark right now through 8/14 for S.O. overtime was approximately \$100,000 +/-

I have not received any of the timecards or 214s for the rest of the county so I cannot provide calculations for that.




