RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the Sheriff to sign post event memorandum of agreements for Dixie Fire law enforcement mutual aid (LEMA) and emergency management mutual aid (EMMA).

BACKGROUND & DISCUSSION:

The Dixie Fire disaster created a significant strain on county resources. This resulted in the need for Plumas County to request law enforcement and emergency management mutual aid.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) requires the county to enter into a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with the entities that provided mutual aid during the disaster. These will be post event agreements that will allow the counties that provided the mutual aid to participate in the cost recovery program.

The LEMA agreement has been approved as to form by County Counsel. A "draft" copy has been attached. The additional agreements are still being drafted and all will be approved by County counsel prior to the Sheriff signing.

**MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN COUNTY OF PLUMAS AND THE
COUNTY OF "BLANK" PERTAINING TO ASSISTANCE PROVIDED UNDER THE
LAW ENFORCEMENT MUTUAL AID PLAN**

WHEREAS, on July 13, 2021, an extreme wildfire, fueled by heavy brush, gusty winds, and low humidity swept through Northern California ("Dixie Fire"); and

WHEREAS, on July 19, 2021, and pursuant to the foregoing provisions, the Plumas County Sheriff acting as the Plumas County Director of Emergency Services proclaimed the existence of a local emergency by proclamation, which the Plumas County Board of Supervisors ratified and continued at its regular meeting on July 20, 2021; and

WHEREAS, on July 23, 2021, the Governor of the State of California proclaimed a State of Emergency to include Plumas County and declared eligibility for Fire Management Assistance Grant and other relief programs; and

WHEREAS, on August 24, 2021, President Joseph R. Biden, Jr. declared the existence of a major disaster, DR-4610, in the State of California in connection with the Dixie Fire and ordered Federal aid to supplement State and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by the Dixie Fire beginning on July 13, 2021, and continuing; and

WHEREAS, the Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Plan delineates the current state policy concerning Emergency Management Mutual Aid; and

WHEREAS, the Emergency Management Mutual Aid Plan is issued and revised under the authority of Sections 8550, 8569, 8615 through 8619, and 8668 of the California Government Code, the California Emergency Plan, and the Master Mutual Aid Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Plan describes the standard procedures used to acquire law enforcement mutual aid resources and the method to ensure coordination of law enforcement mutual aid planning and readiness; and

WHEREAS, the Sheriff of the County of Plumas is the Operational Area Law Enforcement and Mutual Aid Coordinator; and

WHEREAS, the Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Plan provides, in pertinent part, "When an emergency develops or appears to be developing which cannot be resolved by a law enforcement agency within an Operational Area, it is the responsibility of the Operational Area Mutual Aid Coordinator to provide assistance and coordination to control the problem;" and

WHEREAS, the Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Plan provides, in pertinent part, "A request for law enforcement mutual aid requires the approval of the chief law enforcement officer of the requesting jurisdiction"; and

WHEREAS, the Sheriff of the County of Plumas requested the mutual aid assistance of the County of "BLANK", pursuant to the Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Plan to support law enforcement services in connection with the July 2021 Dixie Fire; and

WHEREAS, BLANK County provided mutual aid assistance consisting of law enforcement personnel, equipment, and materials from July, 19, 2021 through September 11, 2021 to assist with law enforcement services in connection with the Dixie Fire; and

WHEREAS, BLANK County agrees to document all of its mutual aid assistance costs related to the Dixie Fire as attachments to this Memorandum of Agreement (“MOA”) and submit to the County of Plumas as soon as practicable.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY AGREED by and between the County of Plumas and the County of BLANK that the County of Plumas shall reimburse all reasonable costs associated with County of BLANK mutual aid assistance provided under this MOA during the Dixie Fire.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED that this MOA constitutes the entire agreement between the County of Plumas and the County of BLANK for the purpose of providing law enforcement personnel, related equipment, and/or related materials and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations, or agreements, whether written or oral. In the event of a dispute between the parties as to the language of this MOA or its construction or meaning of any term, this MOA shall be deemed to have been drafted by the parties in equal parts so that no presumptions or inferences concerning its terms or interpretation may be construed against any party to this MOA.

Subject: Approval of Payments to Jet Plumbing and Easy Rooter Plumbing for Emergency Repair of BCSA Sewer Pump without a Contract



BACKGROUND:

On September 29, 2021, the Beckwourth CSA operator reported that the pump station had become clogged again. After repeated attempts to reverse the pump direction in hopes of dislodging the debris it was determined that a plumber was needed to physically remove the debris. Plumas Sanitation was called to pump the wet well to keep it from overflowing and causing a spill. Pumping the wet well to prevent overflows does not require pumping to the bottom of the wet well, which requires a more powerful pump to be efficient. Plumas Sanitation pumped the wet well once on the 29th, twice on the 30th and once on October 1st.

Jet Plumbing was contacted and scheduled to respond on Friday October 1st at 5PM on overtime and Easy Rooter was scheduled to respond at the same time. This was the earliest Jet Plumbing could respond. Easy Rooter was determined to be more economical than Plumas Sanitation for pumping the deep wet well, due to a more powerful pump truck. Both responded Friday afternoon and were successful in pumping the wet well quickly and removing the wipes that were wrapped around the pump impellor. A news letter to customers is drafted emphasizing not flushing wipes and explaining the cost of removing wipes from the pump impellor.

Plumas Sanitation invoice was requested, but was not received in time for this agenda request and will be submitted for approval under a future separate agenda request. The fee from Easy Rooter for pumping the wet well is \$2,100. The Jet Plumbing invoice totals \$2,096 for emergency repairs. Reimbursement from ARPA funds will be sought since the wipes are due to COVID-19.

RECOMMENDATION

The Beckwourth CSA Manager respectfully requests that the Governing Board authorize the Manager of the Beckwourth CSA to pay the invoice from Easy Rooter Plumbing totaling \$2,100 and invoice from Jet Plumbing totaling \$2,096 without a contract and to ratify all approved emergency repair work performed to date.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

Adopt Resolution approving the Scope of Work for the DROC Technical Advisor for coordination of the disaster recovery efforts and adopt Resolution appointing Cindi Dunsmore as the Disaster Recovery Operations Center (DROC) Technical Advisor.

Plumas County was declared County emergency based on Resolution # 21-8605 ratifying the Proclamation of a Countywide Local Emergency due to the Dixie Fire Significantly affecting Communities in Plumas County.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSIONS


It is the recommendation of the DROC Director, Dennis Schmidt, to work with Cindi Dunsmore for technical assistance for the DROC operations and to meet the FEMA requirements for reimbursement. On October 7, 2021 the County was provided the FEMA briefing along with Cal OES. The FEMA briefing starts the time line for required documentation needed for reimbursement. We have a lack of County staff resources that are up to date on FEMA requirements, it is imperative for the County to have the limited technical advice needed to be successful. Cindi was in a lead role for the Butte County disasters working on Oroville Spillway crisis, Camp Fire, North Complex Fire and a few others. It will invaluable to have her expertise and ability to provide the needed technical assistance to the County from a County prospective.

As the DROC Logistics Chief, please consider this request and approved the attached resolutions. The of Plumas County's Dixie Fire will need the technical support due to recovery efforts and to meet the FEMA documentation requirements.

Scope of Work

DROC Technical Advisor Objectives:

Provides assistance in the technical aspects for FEMA and Cal OES reporting for the Disaster Recovery Operations (DROC) for Dixie Fire in Plumas County.; advises County emergency and disaster related efforts related to planning, recovery, and mitigation; manage training, outreach and reporting activities; manage funding; provide strategic and operational oversight.

Provides coordination with appropriate County personnel to meet the overall DROC objectives.

The individual will function independently as the DROC Technical Advisor. This position is expected to have a comprehensive knowledge of all emergency and disaster activities related to fire related recovery, including the FEMA requirements for funds reimbursement and Cal OES requirements.

Essential Functions not limited to the following:

- Provides technical assistant to the operations of the Dixie Fire Disaster Recovery Operations Center.





Post-Incident Agreements

When the Requesting and Providing Entities do not have a written agreement, OR where such an agreement exists but is silent on reimbursement, the entities may verbally agree on the resources to be provided and on the terms, conditions, and costs of such assistance.

The agreement should be consistent with past practices for mutual aid between the entities. For example, if the Requesting Entity does not normally reimburse a Providing Entity for its costs, it should not agree to do so specifically for the declared incident.

Prior to funding, the Requesting Entity must document the verbal agreement in writing, have it executed by an official of each entity with the authority to request and provide assistance, and submit it to FEMA (preferably within 30 days of the Applicant's Briefing).¹⁸²

Eligibility

Mutual aid resources are eligible when used for Emergency Work, emergency utility restoration (regardless of whether it is deemed Category B or F) or grant management activities [subject to the criteria in FEMA Recovery Policy FP 104-11-2, *Public Assistance Management Costs (Interim)*]. Mutual aid work is subject to the same eligibility criteria as contract work. Costs to transport the Providing Entity's equipment and personnel to the declared area are eligible.

Ineligible work performed by a Providing Entity includes, but is not limited to:

- Preparing to deploy;
- Dispatch operations outside the receiving State, Territory, or Tribe;
- Training and exercises; and
- Support for long-term recovery and mitigation operations.

The Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC) is a national interstate mutual aid agreement that enables States and Territories to share resources in response to an incident. Work performed outside the receiving State or Territory that is associated with the operation of EMAC, including tracking of resources, is ineligible unless the work is associated with the receiving State's or Territory's emergency operations for the incident.

The Providing Entity's straight-time and overtime labor are eligible, including fringe benefits. When the Requesting Entity is a SLTT government and the Providing Entity is another division within the same SLTT government, straight-time for budgeted employees of the Providing Entity is ineligible.

If the Providing Entity backfills deployed personnel, overtime for backfill personnel is eligible even if they are not performing eligible work. However, straight-time for backfill personnel is ineligible.

FEMA reimburses the use of equipment provided to a Requesting Entity based on either the terms of the agreement or equipment rates FEMA provides PA funding to repair damage to this equipment the same way as it provides PA funding to repair damage to Applicant-owned equipment

The Applicant needs to submit the following to support mutual aid costs claimed (not an all-inclusive list):

- Written agreement (required);
- Services requested and received (required);
- Same information listed for labor, equipment, and supplies (required as applicable); and
- Invoices (representative sample required when requested).

JOB DESCRIPTION CONTACT TRACER

EXTRA-HELP POSITIONS ARE 29 HOURS A WEEK OR LESS

DEFINITION

A Contact Tracer is a non-licensed public health professional providing support to a health department in the fight against COVID-19.

DISTINGUISHING CHARACTERISTICS

The contact tracer is responsible for reaching out to people (contacts) who have been exposed to COVID-19 and providing health education and guidance to interrupt ongoing disease transmission. Dialogue with contacts will be guided by standard protocols to obtain any symptom history and other relevant health information, provide instructions for self-quarantine, and make appropriate referrals to testing, clinical services, and other essential support services. This position will require prioritization, prompt action, and attention to detail in documentation and data management as multiple investigations will be conducted simultaneously. Contract tracers are required to follow all designated scripts and comply with policies and procedures provided by the health department regarding confidentiality and data security for the handling of sensitive client information and protected health information.

Qualifications

Graduation from an accredited college or university with an associate's degree or Bachelor's degree in public or community health education or other relevant degree such as biological or physical sciences, psychology, education, or sociology

OR High school diploma and 2 years college-level study in a relevant field, as specified above,

OR High school diploma and 2 years previous experience in working in a public services field.

SUBJECT: PUBLIC HEARING: ADOPT RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE 2035 GENERAL PLAN PUBLIC HEALTH & SAFETY ELEMENT AMENDMENT TO ADDRESS COMPLIANCE WITH ASSEMBLY BILL 2140

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. Hold a PUBLIC HEARING.
2. Adopt RESOLUTION (Attachment 2) adopting the 2035 General Plan Public Health & Safety Element Amendment to address compliance with Assembly Bill 2140.

BACKGROUND:

The Public Health & Safety Element is one of the seven (7) state-mandated elements of the Plumas County General Plan and provides the policy context for protecting and reducing the risk of both natural and man-made hazards to County residents, workers, visitors and properties of the unincorporated area of Plumas County.

On September 29, 2006 Assembly Bill 2140 was signed into law that added Section 65302.6 and Section 8685.9 to the California Government Code. Government Code Section 65302.6 authorizes a city, county, or a city and county to adopt with its safety element a local hazard mitigation plan in accordance with the federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000. Government Code Section 8685.9 prohibits the state share for any eligible project from exceeding 75% of total state eligible costs unless the local agency is located within a city, county, or city and county that has adopted a local hazard mitigation plan in accordance with the federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 as part of the safety element of its general plan, in which case the Legislature may provide for a state share of local costs that exceeds 75% of total state eligible costs.

On June 15, 2021 the Plumas County Board of Supervisors adopted Resolution 21-8596 that resolved to: 1) adopt the Plumas County Local Hazard Mitigation Plan 2020 Update as an official plan, 2) adopt the Plumas County Local Hazard Mitigation Plan 2020 Update by reference into the General Plan Public Health & Safety Element in accordance with the requirements of Assembly Bill 2140; and 3) submit the adoption resolution to the California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Region IX to enable the Plan's final approval in accordance with the requirements of the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2020 and to establish conformance with the requirements of Assembly Bill 2140.

On June 16, 2021 Plumas County submitted the adoption resolution to Cal OES and FEMA Region IX, and on June 23, 2021 FEMA Region IX completed its review and found the Plumas County Local Hazard Mitigation Plan 2020 Update to be in conformance with the Code of Federal Regulations, Title 44, Part 201, Section 6 (44 C.F.R. 201.6).

The Board of Supervisors, County of Plumas Resolution No. 2021-8619 adopted on August 17, 2021 directed the Planning Department to prepare the Draft Amendment to the 2035 General Plan Public Health & Safety Element for compliance with Assembly Bill 2140 (2007); directed the Planning Department to submit the 2035 General Plan Public Health & Safety Element Draft Amendment to the Geological Survey Division of the California Department of Conservation pursuant to Government Code Section 65302.5(a), the State Board of Forestry and Fire Protection pursuant to Government Code Section 65302.5(b)(1), and every local agency that provides fire protection to the unincorporated area of Plumas County pursuant to Government Code Section 65302.5(b)(1); and directed the Planning Department to undertake the general plan amendment process.

DISCUSSION:

In order to complete the general plan amendment process for compliance with Assembly Bill 2140, the General Plan Public Health & Safety Element was amended by the Plumas County Planning Department to include language stating the Local Hazard Mitigation Plan was developed in accordance with the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 and follows FEMA's Local Hazard Mitigation Plan guidance, in addition to including a hyperlink to both the Local Hazard Mitigation Plan 2020 Update document and the Plumas County web page URL, as to where the 2020 Update and associated hazard mitigation information can be found.

On October 7, 2021, the Planning Commission held a properly noticed public hearing on the 2035 General Plan Public Health & Safety Element Draft Amendment and upon the conclusion of the public hearing, the Planning Commission recommended that the Board of Supervisors (Attachment 1 – Resolution No. P.C. 2021-1) find the Amendment exempt from CEQA and adopt the Amendment (GPA 8-21/22-02) as presented.

Geological Survey Division of the California Department of Conservation, State Board of Forestry and Fire Protection, and Local Fire Protection Districts. On August 30, 2021 the Planning Department submitted the Draft Amendment to the State Board of Forestry and Fire Protection, and on August 31, 2021 the Draft Amendment was submitted to the Geological Survey Division of the California Department of Conservation and every local agency that provides fire protection to the unincorporated area of Plumas County. At the meeting of September 21, 2021 of the State Board of Forestry and Fire Protection's Resource Protection Committee, the Draft Amendment was reviewed by the committee members and no substantive comments were provided that would require a response or modification by Plumas County to the Draft Amendment. Additionally, no comments were provided by the Geological Survey Division or any local fire protection districts.

California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The incorporation of the Local Hazard Mitigation Plan 2020 Update into the General Plan Public Health & Safety Element with strictly administrative text changes is proposed to be exempt from environmental review as required by CEQA through CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(b)(3), which is the common sense exception that states CEQA only applies to projects that have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment, as it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity in question may have a significant effect on the environment (Attachment 3 – CEQA Notice of Exemption).

Senate Bill 18. The Planning Department recognizes Senate Bill 18 requires agencies to consult and provide opportunities for California Native American tribal involvement during the preparation or amendment of the general plan; and because this particular General Plan Public Health & Safety Element Amendment is to address compliance with Assembly Bill 2140, which is highly procedural as directed by state law and does not affect open space lands or culturally sensitive areas; staff defers Senate Bill 18 duties to when the County prepares a comprehensive amendment to the General Plan Public Health & Safety Element, at which such time this Amendment will be considered.



THE PURPOSE OF THE PLUMAS COUNTY BEHAVIORAL HEALTH COMMISSION

The purpose of the Commission is to review PCBH operations, community programs, department policies, and best practices for the provision of mental health (MH) and substance use disorder (SUD) services to Plumas County Medi-Cal beneficiaries, to advise the department on local MH and SUDS decision making, and to make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors.

The Plumas County Behavioral Health Commission (PCBHC) meets in public a minimum of 10 times per year, in person or virtually, depending on current, adopted public health restrictions. To facilitate participation and member retention, PCBH budgets and supports reimbursement to any commissioner who requires assistance with obtaining technology (loaned computer and monitor equipment may be available) and network connectivity to be able to review PCBHC business, including but not limited to: agendas, minutes, county and department policies, reports, plans, presentations, trainings, or any other business to be discussed, reviewed, or acted upon by the commission, which are electronically mailed to the commissioners, staff, and public stakeholders, per Brown Act requirements.

THE DUTIES OF THE BEHAVIORAL HEALTH COMMISSION

The duties of the Plumas County Behavioral Health Commission, as defined in the Welfare and Institutions Code and the Health and Safety Code, shall be: A. Duties Per WIC Section 5604.2(General Provisions) and Any Future Amendments thereto. These duties include:

- Review and evaluate the community's public mental/behavioral health needs, services, facilities, and special problems in any facility within Plumas County, including, but not limited to, schools, emergency departments, and psychiatric facilities.
- Review any county agreements entered into pursuant to Section 5650. PCBHC may make recommendations to the Plumas County Board of Supervisors regarding concerns identified within these agreements.
- Advise the Plumas County Board of Supervisors, and the Plumas County Behavioral Health director as to any aspect of the local mental/behavioral health program. PCBHC may request assistance from the local patients' rights advocates when reviewing and advising on mental/behavioral health evaluations or services provided in public facilities with limited access.
- Review and approve the procedures used to ensure citizen and professional involvement at all stages of the planning process. Involvement shall include individuals with lived experience of mental/behavioral illness and their families, community members, advocacy organizations, and mental/behavioral health professionals. It shall also include other professionals that interact with individuals living with mental/behavioral illnesses on a daily basis, such as education, emergency services, employment, health care, housing, law enforcement, local business owners, social services, seniors, transportation, and veterans.
- Submit an annual report to the Plumas County Board of Supervisors on the needs and performance of Plumas County's mental/behavioral health system.

- Review and make recommendations on applicants for the appointment of a Plumas County director of mental/behavioral health services. PCBHC shall be included in the selection process prior to the vote of the Plumas County Board of Supervisors.
- Review and comment on Plumas County's performance outcome data and communicate its findings to the California Behavioral Health Planning Council.
- As part of its duties above, PCBHC shall assess the impact of the realignment of services from the state to the county, on services delivered to clients and on the local community. Revised:

Duties Per WIC Section 5848(b) (Oversight and Accountability, and Any Future Amendments thereto.

- PCBHC shall conduct a public hearing on the draft three-year program and expenditure plan and annual updates at the close of the 30-day comment period required by subdivision.
 - Each adopted three-year program and expenditure plan and update shall include any substantive written recommendations for revisions. The adopted three-year program and expenditure plan or update shall summarize and analyze the recommended revisions. PCBHC shall review the adopted plan or update and make recommendations to Plumas County Behavioral Health for revisions.

Duties Per HSC Section 11998.1(f) and Any Future Amendments thereto.

- Review the Plumas County Behavioral Health Department's Alcohol and Drug Five-Year Plan, including consultation as needed to comply with the legislative goals set forth in Health and Safety Code section 11998.1(f).

Number and Composition of Membership

- The PCBHC shall consist of eight (8) members.
 - One (1) member shall be a member of the Board of Supervisors, the governing body.
 - Fifty (50) percent or more of the members shall be consumers or family members who are or have received mental/behavioral Health services, as follows:
 - at least twenty (20) percent direct consumers;
 - at least twenty (20) percent family members,
 - and if not covered in these four, one (1) Alcohol and Drug Abuse representative.
 - Fifty (50) percent or less of membership shall be community members representing public interest in the behavioral health needs of Plumas County, especially recommended: persons in the professions of human services, education, law, criminal justice, fiscal management, treatment/recovery (e.g. AIDS treatment), students/parents, other private industry, organizations involved in drug/alcohol services, and organized labor (e.g. Employee Assistance Program representative).
 - Membership shall reflect the diversity and demographics of the county as a whole, to the extent feasible (WIC 5604.5(b)).
 - It is advisable, but not mandatory, that representatives of each major community of the county be selected.
 - All members shall be residents of Plumas County or be substantially employed in the county.
 - Except as provided in the following paragraph, a member of PCBHC or the member's spouse shall not be a full-time or part-time county employee of a county mental health service, an employee of the State Department of Health Care Services, or an employee of, or a paid member of the governing body of, a mental health contract agency. A consumer of mental health services who has obtained employment with an employer described in the previous paragraph and who holds a position in which the consumer does not have any interest, influence, or authority over any financial or contractual matter concerning the employer may be appointed to PCBHC. The member shall abstain from voting on any financial or contractual issue concerning the member's employer that may come before PCBHC. Members of PCBHC

shall abstain from voting on any issue in which the member has a financial interest as defined in Section 87103 of the Government Code. (WIC 5604(e).

Terms of Membership

- The term of each member (ending December 31st) shall be for three (3) years with approximately one-third of the members changing each year.
- No member shall serve more than two (2) consecutive three-year appointments with the exception that if a member has been appointed to a partial term, he/she may then be appointed by the Board of Supervisors to two full three-year terms.
- When a vacancy occurs, the new member appointed to fill the vacancy will only be appointed for the remainder of the un-expired term of the vacated position.
 - Extending new membership after partial-term is completed: only the Board of Supervisors has the authority to extend or re-appoint a Commissioner's term.
- When one year has elapsed following a former member's service on PCBHC, of whatever duration that service was, he/she again becomes eligible for appointment.

This is an appeal of the Zoning Administrator decision of September 8, 2021. More specifically, Conditions of approval 10 and 14 as listed in Exhibit 26:

“10. Mitigation Measure WIL-a: Prepare and Implement Fire Prevention Plan. “p) The applicant shall coordinate the finalization of road improvement with CAL FIRE and other emergency responders to ensure that sufficient ingress and egress exists onsite.”

“14. The project proponent shall prepare an Emergency Response Plan in consultation with and agreed upon by the Beckwourth Fire Protection District, the Lassen-Modoc Unit of the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CALFIRE), and the Plumas County Sheriff, and submit the final Emergency Response Plan to the Plumas County Planning Director prior to issuance of the first building permit.”

From appellant's Statement of the Reasons for the Appeal:

“It is understood from all of the evidence presented that the current Emergency Response Plan includes using an existing easement over the land of the Appellants without consultation or agreement. Any use of Appellant's property or the existing easement by this proposed project will overburden the easement and potential increase the costs of maintenance. Notwithstanding the proviso that the condition is that Applicant prepare an Emergency Response Plan, the Appellants have been left out of the process.”

From appellant's Summation of the Arguments to be Raised by the Appellant(s):

“A permit even if conditional cannot affect the rights of other property owners, nor does the government have the authority to expand the use of an easement previously granted.”



- (b) Any owner of real property within 300 feet of the exterior boundaries of the property involved who was present at the original hearing or who presented written testimony before the Zoning Administrator or the Planning Commission, or who may be adversely affected by the decision of the Planning Director;
- (c) Such other person whom the Board determines to have been adversely affected by the decision; or
- (d) Any County department head whose department has an interest in the decision.

Such appeal shall be filed with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors within ten (10) calendar days from the date of the decision, except for recommendations on general plan amendments which by State law are subject to a five (5) calendar day appeal period. Filing shall include all information requested herein and shall be accompanied by the appropriate filing fee. The statements (required below) must contain sufficient explanation of the reasons for and matters being appealed in order to facilitate the Board of Supervisors initial determination as to the propriety and merit of the appeal. Any appeal which fails to provide an adequate statement may be summarily denied. The filing of such an appeal within the above stated time limit shall stay the effective date of the action until the Board of Supervisors has acted upon the appeal.
